
# Fighting for the British

Extract of a letter from Monmouth county, June 12.


"Ty, with his party of about 20 blacks and whites, laft Friday afternoon took and carried off prifoners, Capt. Barns Smock and Gilbert Vanmater; at the fame time fpiked up the iron four pounder at Capt. Smock's house, but took no ammunition: Two of the artillery horses, and two of Capt. Smock's horses, were likewise taken off."

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
The above-mentioned Ty is a Negroe, who bears the title of Colonel, and commands a motly crew at Sandy-Hook.















Petition of Thomas Peters to the British Prime Minister demanding a "competent settlement" for black Loyalists




Tenskwatawa: "The Prophet"
